The show features fifty four Russian works of art, some little known in the West. So it gives us great pleasure to display these in the Braccio di Carlo Magno at St. Peter's, the heart of Christianity, in order to share them with pilgrims and visitors to the Vatican, and create that bridge.

I would especially like to thank Zelfira Tregulova, Director General of the State Tretyakov Gallery, and all her staff, for coordinating the whole initiative. My gratitude also goes to Sergey Perov, Director General of the State Museum and Exhibition Centre 'ROSIZO', to all the lender museums and, of course, the State Tretyakov Gallery Support Foundation, represented by Executive Director Olga Dranichkina, for its indispensable help in realizing the project.

A sincere thank-you also to His Excellency Alexander Avdeev, Ambassador of the Russian Federation to the Holy See, for his invaluable collaboration.

Lastly, I would like to thank all my collaborators at the Vatican Museums, the Pope's Museums, who have worked to display these Russian masterpieces that have made a pilgrimage to a universal place of art: the Braccio di Carlo Magno.
